

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Treasurer's Message



"Vibrant, resilient, future focused and ready to boom: this is a Budget to lock in a strong regional recovery, as we look to an even stronger future."

The NSW economy is back on the road to recovery, and with the 2021-22 NSW Budget, we're investing to ensure regional New South Wales reaps the rewards of the rebound.

It's a strong turnaround from the biggest global health and economic crisis in a generation. But with a virus that has forced international borders to close (and some state borders too), one silver lining is that we have had good reason to look more closely at our own backyard and better appreciate the treasures to be found there.

For many people across our state, that has meant **falling in love with regional NSW** all over again.

More holidaymakers are enjoying the local sights, and with a pandemic-inspired move to more flexible working arrangements across the economy, a new generation is getting down to business in our regions.

They are doing so at an exciting time, because the future has never been brighter. The 2021-22 Budget invests **billions of dollars** in regional New South Wales, building on strong foundations to create vibrant economies, jobs and industries of the future, centred around thriving communities.

Our COVID-safe strategy will keep regions safe and secure, as we continue to restore regional jobs lost to the pandemic. The **\$100 million Regional Job Creation Fund** will leverage over half a billion dollars of private investment and create thousands of jobs in the regions.

Major new infrastructure projects will keep our regions connected, including the Great Western Highway Upgrade and the Coffs Harbour Bypass. And regional-based seniors will benefit from a two year extension of the \$250 travel card.

We're investing to help farming communities stay at the cutting edge of agricultural technology and supporting mining communities through the Resources for Regions program.

With tourists flocking to regional holiday destinations, we're making the investments that will keep them coming back, with funding for visitor infrastructure, cultural facilities and major events.

Many communities are still recovering from recent drought, fires and floods, so we are continuing to fund recovery for those in need and investing to build resilience in the future.

And we're laying the foundations for future jobs and industries, investing in Special Activation Precincts around the state and Regional Job Precincts programs to grow our regional industries including manufacturing, agtech, freight and logistics, while building capacity in regional health, education and transport services.

Vibrant, resilient, future-focused and ready to boom: this is a Budget to lock in a strong regional recovery, as we look to an even stronger future.

Strong regions with strong economies



Regional NSW is a key component of the State's economic success. It accounts for around 34 per cent of the State's population, around 25 per cent of the NSW economy and makes a very significant contribution to NSW's exports.

The 2021-22 NSW Budget continues the NSW Government's focus on vibrant and dynamic economies in Regional NSW ensuring regional communities have the additional boost they need to rebuild, recover and rebound from recent and current challenges.

Regional communities across the State have proved their resilience in the face of drought, bushfires, COVID-19, flooding and now a mouse plague. The NSW Government, together with the Commonwealth Government, has supported this resilience with close to \$10.0 billion of natural disaster response and recovery funding.

The NSW Government remains committed to supporting vital regional industries, including agriculture and forestry, mining, fisheries, manufacturing and services sectors. A forward-looking focus will help regional economies to further specialise in new industries and adopt innovative practices.

The investments the NSW Government is making will:

- assist businesses to expand, establish, invest and create more jobs
- ensure communities get the services they need to recover, grow and thrive
- protect and improve the environment and local character of our regions
- enable the continued response to recent natural disasters of storm, flood, COVID-19 and mouse plaque
- prepare for the future with drought and regional water strategies; and
- improve road, rail and digital connections between the regions and the cities to speed up the movement of goods and improve access.

Supporting our regions



BOOSTING JOBS AND SKILLS

The NSW Government's \$4.2 billion Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund is capitalising on regional strengths and supporting businesses to create jobs in the regions. The recovering economy needs the right skills for today while maximising the opportunities of tomorrow. The NSW Government is establishing the \$2.0 billion Snowy Hydro Investment Fund for projects identified in five priority areas: water security in priority catchments; investing in digital connectivity; improving passenger road and rail; freight linkages; and establishing Special Activation Precincts.

In 2021-22, new investments and allocations include:

- \$50.0 million for Mobile Coverage, which will invest in infrastructure and emerging technologies to deliver improved mobile coverage across regional NSW; and
- \$47.9 million for an expanded Farms of the Future program. This is in addition to the \$400.0 million Regional Digital Connectivity program.

Continuing NSW Government investment includes:

- \$79.5 million in 2021-22 to continue the \$100.0 million Regional Job Creation Fund. This fund:
 - supports businesses in NSW regions to grow; and
 - encourages interstate or overseas businesses to invest in regional NSW.

SPECIAL ACTIVATION PRECINCTS

The NSW Government is continuing its \$462.3 million commitment over four years for Special Activation Precincts, moving from development to delivery. These are a new way of planning and delivering industrial and commercial infrastructure projects in dedicated areas in regional NSW. They bring together planning and investment support services. This Budget includes over four years:

- \$185.4 million for the Parkes Special Activation Precinct, which covers around 4,800 hectares, at the only junction of Australia's two rail spines, the Inland Rail and Trans-Australia Railway
- \$157.5 million for the 4,500-hectare Wagga Wagga Special Activation Precinct, which will create up to 6,000

- \$75.0 million for Special Activation Precincts pre-delivery works
- \$25.4 million over three years for future Special Activation Precincts, including development of the potential Narrabri precinct and continued planning for Moree and the Snowy Mountains precincts; and
- \$5.0 million for the Regional Job Precincts initiative, an extension of the Special Activation Precinct program, to deliver streamlined planning approvals across the state including in Albury, Richmond Valley, South Jerrabomberra and Namoi.

GETTING FUTURE READY

The NSW Government's refreshed 20-Year Economic Vision for Regional NSW plan has outlined the importance of helping regional communities prepare for future challenges and opportunities. Support includes:

- \$259.7 million in 2021-22 (as part of a \$1.3 billion project) to expand and enhance the Public Safety Network (PSN) to deliver full-state coverage, enhancing the ability to respond to emergencies across the state and addressing recommendations from the NSW Bushfire Inquiry:
 - improving coverage of the emergency services radio network; and



- putting all NSW emergency services organisations onto one network
- Establishing the Royalties for Rejuvenation Fund, which will reach around \$300.0 million by 2030-31. The Fund will invest to support coal mining communities as their economies transition
- Approximately \$550.0 million Restart NSW funding in 2021-22 granted directly to local councils and organisations to enable the funding and delivery of infrastructure projects that improve the State's economic growth and productivity. This includes \$168.1 million in 2021-22 through the Regional Growth: Economic Activation Fund for business enterprise areas, airport upgrades, industrial and logistics hubs, innovation precincts and other infrastructure projects; and
- **\$63.4 million** over four years for the Future Ready Regions package to help regional communities prepare for future droughts by investing in tools, skills and data. Initiatives include:
 - \$47.9 million for the Farms of the Future program

- \$5.5 million for the Farm Business Resilience program
- \$4.3 million for Enhanced Drought Information Systems; and
- \$5.8 million to assess groundwater and underground storage in central and far western NSW.

Mining continues to drive prosperity in New South Wales. Remediating legacy mine projects with an additional \$110.4 million over 10 years, while continuing to foster the mining projects of tomorrow, will accelerate economic growth, support jobs and boost community liveability.

Driving new investment in exploration and mining and forging a path for high-tech and critical minerals projects will also be a focus in 2021-22 and beyond.

The NSW Government is taking a balanced approach to supporting responsible coal production whilst also considering the mineral opportunities that lay ahead and to support the diversification of coal-reliant regional economies.

This includes:

- \$2.2 million over two years for Round 4 of the Cooperative Drilling Program to remove funding barriers for explorers
- the State's first Critical Minerals Strategy will be developed, with a goal to unlock the industry's potential
- continuation of the State's work to map mineral deposits through large scale precompetitive data acquisition; and
- a new Investment Development team to help make NSW the number one destination for resources investment in Australia.

FOSTERING REGIONAL **GROWTH**

The NSW Government's **\$2.0 billion** Regional Growth Fund is delivering projects that facilitate regional development and deliver new and upgraded local amenities. In 2021-22, programs within the Fund forecast spending \$398.4 million to continue delivery of more than 2,100 projects. This includes:

- \$100.0 million for Round 4 of the Stronger Country Communities Fund, including up to \$50.0 million in funding to increase female participation in sport
- \$75.0 million for Round 8 of the Resources for Regions Fund, supporting miningimpacted communities to improve local amenities and infrastructure
- \$69.9 million for projects funded through Rounds 1-3 of the Stronger Country Communities Fund
- **\$50 million** in 2021-22 to promote regional tourism and events through the \$20 million Regional Events Acceleration Fund and the \$30 million Regional Tourism Activation Fund; and
- \$20.7 million for projects funded through Round 7 of the Resources for Regions Fund.

OTHER REGIONAL INVESTMENT

• \$30.0 million in 2021-22 (as part of a \$60.0 million program) for the Creative Capital program to deliver new cultural infrastructure projects in Greater Sydney and regional NSW, boosting community participation in the arts and cultural tourism; and



• \$10.3 million in 2021-22 (as part of an \$80.4 million capital project) for new signature walking experiences across New South Wales, making our natural and cultural heritage assets in our NSW national parks a must-see destination for local, national and international visitors.

REGIONAL DIGITAL CONNECTIVITY

A commitment to upgrading digital network infrastructure will enable businesses to work faster and the people of New South Wales to stay connected. This includes:

- \$100.0 million for the Gig State project to upgrade digital network infrastructure to deliver metro-level internet services to regional businesses and residents
- \$50.0 million for the Mobile Coverage Project to invest in infrastructure and emerging technologies to deliver improved regional mobile coverage; and
- \$47.9 million for the expanded Farms of the Future program, which includes constructing and operating Long Range Wide Area Networks and grants to farmers to stimulate adoption of agtech devices and apps.

RISING FROM RECENT **CHALLENGES**

The NSW Government continues to stand by farmers, their families and rural communities who have faced a series of challenges, with close to \$10.0 billion in programs to repair, recover and rebuild. Support includes:

- \$590.4 million for the 2021 NSW Storm and Flood Recovery Package, in partnership with the Commonwealth, to support local communities to clean up and recover from the significant storms and floods that have impacted large areas of New South Wales. The Package includes:
 - \$215.3 million to clean up storm and flood impacted properties, essential public assets, community, cultural and recreation assets and environmental assets
 - \$203.7 million for Recovery Programs to assist community, infrastructure, industry and environmental recovery over the medium to longer term (additional funding is being sought from the Commonwealth); and
 - \$171.4 million for disaster recovery grants of up to \$50,000 for small businesses and non-profit organisations and grants of up to \$75,000 for primary producers who have suffered direct damage.
- \$140.0 million in 2021-22 (\$150.0 million over two years) for the Mouse Plague Response Program to expand help for rural and regional communities. This includes:
 - \$95.0 million for primary producer rebates for baits of up to 50 per cent of actual expenses incurred capped to \$10,000 per business
 - establishing grain treatment facilities at specified locations across rural and regional NSW for farmers to have their grain treated, free of charge
 - rebates for small businesses of up to \$1,000 and households of up to \$500 through Service NSW to help meet the cost of buying bait
 - \$5.0 million for freight rebates to manufacturers to expedite the import of zinc phosphide concentrate; and
 - educational workshops and research projects.

The NSW Government has committed approximately \$4.5 billion in drought assistance and water security support. In 2021-22, a new initiative is:

• \$38.2 million for Round 2 of the Commonwealth Government's **Emergency Water Infrastructure** Rebate program, supporting innovative on-farm infrastructure investment and drought preparedness.

This Budget also continues drought programs from existing commitments, including:

- \$68.6 million in 2021-22 as part of the \$1.0 billion Safe and Secure Water Program, providing safe, secure and sustainable water and wastewater services to regional NSW
- continuing the \$1.0 billion Farm Innovation Fund to provide concessional loans and boost drought resilience
- \$310.0 million to help regional communities recover from the drought; and
- continuing to deliver infrastructure projects under the \$170.0 million Drought Stimulus Package.

RESPONSE TO THE BUSHFIRE INQUIRY

The NSW Government is continuing to provide its **\$4.5 billion** of recovery support, in partnership with the Commonwealth, to recover from the devastating 2019-20 summer bushfires. It has accepted all 76 recommendations of the NSW Bushfire Inquiry.

In May 2020, the Government established Resilience NSW with \$187.5 million to deliver a whole-of-government approach to prevention, preparedness, response and recovery to disasters and emergencies.

In this Budget, the Government is committing a further **\$268.2 million**, co-funded with the Commonwealth Government, in response to the NSW Bushfire Inquiry. Key components of the response include:

- \$65.6 million over four years from 2021-22 for implementation of operational system upgrades and capability improvements
- \$50.9 million over two years from 2021-22 to extend fleet replacement and vehicle safety retrofits across the fire, rescue, forestry, and national parks fleets
- \$40.3 million over four years from 2021-22 for the Bushfire and Natural

Hazards Research and Technology Program (subject to finalisation of business case and gateway review)

- \$37.6 million in 2022-23 to extend funding for National Parks and Wildlife Service fire fighters and NSW Rural Fire Service mitigation crews; and
- \$34.4 million over four years for the strategic fire trail network and funding for critical regional Private Land Fire Trail staff.

This funding builds on the Government's initial commitment of \$192.2 million for key initiatives in response to the NSW Bushfire Inquiry, providing protection for communities and properties, as well as support for emergency service workers.

The Government is continuing with its \$1.0 billion Bushfire Infrastructure Package to clean up and repair roads, bridges, schools and other State assets affected by the bushfires, including upgrading critical communication networks used by emergency service workers.

This is complemented by the **\$540.0 million**Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Package, co-funded with the Commonwealth
Government, to support job retention and creation in bushfire-impacted regions.




PROTECTING OUR WILDLIFE AND ENVIRONMENT

Investing in the protection and preservation of New South Wale's natural capital and wildlife ensures the quality of our environment is sustained for future generations and supports regional economies through tourism attraction. Support includes:

- An additional \$47.5 million over four years and \$110.4 million over 10 years to deliver remediation projects at 20 high and extreme-risk legacy mine sites to improve environmental and human health outcomes, and invigorate local regional economies
- \$40.0 million in 2021-22 for Local Land Services to support travelling stock reserves, natural resource management, agricultural advice, animal and plant biosecurity and emergency management
- \$35.0 million in 2021-22 to boost NSW's early detection and response to exotic biosecurity threats

- around \$30.0 million in 2021-22 to continue delivery of the NSW Marine Estate Management Strategy, addressing the greatest threats to the health of the NSW coast
- \$21.7 million in 2021-22 (\$65.3 million over four years) for Environmental Trust grants to the National Parks and Wildlife Service. to support:
 - the acquisition of high value conservation land for protection in the NSW national parks estate
 - rewilding of threatened fauna; and
 - implementation of ecological health monitoring and reporting projects.
- \$15.0 million in 2021-22 (\$75 million over five years) to continue the Saving Our Species program, New South Wales' flagship threatened species conservation program, to maximise the number of threatened species and ecological communities that are secure in the wild across the State.

DELIVERING HIGH QUALITY AND ACCESSIBLE SERVICES

The NSW Government is making a significant investment in infrastructure and services to meet the needs of communities living and working in regional locations, including education, healthcare and support for young people.

This includes over **\$1.9 billion** in 2021-22 for major works on new and upgraded hospitals, health facilities and schools in rural and regional New South Wales.


- Almost a third of the record health infrastructure spend in the 2021-22 NSW Budget will go to regional and rural areas, with just over \$900.0 million allocated, including four new and 24 upgraded regional hospitals and six hospital car parks; and
- over a third of the major works spend on schools in the 2021-22 NSW Budget will go to regional and rural areas, with just over \$1.0 billion allocated for new and upgraded regional schools.

EDUCATION

- \$280.4 million in 2021-22 to give over 1,000 regional, rural and remote schools across NSW the best available digital teaching and learning tools
- \$110.8 million in 2021-22 to continue rollout of the Regional School Renewal Program
- \$30.0 million in 2021-22 for the ongoing Regional Roof Upgrade Program; and
- \$12.0 million in 2021-22 for refreshing regional TAFE campus ICT facilities to enhance student experience.

HEALTHCARE

- Multipurpose Services Strategy Stage 5
 (as part of a \$296.5 million program) –
 17 centres delivered so far and two
 underway in 2021-22; and
- Rural Ambulance Infrastructure Redevelopment Stages 1 and 2 (as part of a \$232.1 million program) - 23 ambulance stations delivered so far and 30 underway in 2021-22.



Other 2021-22 highlights include:

- \$36.4 million over four years for 57 mental health Response and Recovery Specialists to provide assertive outreach support for communities and coordination with local services at the time of a disaster or crisis, and during the ongoing recovery phase
- \$34.0 million over four years to convert NSW Ambulance paramedics to Intensive Care Paramedics, with 203 to be located in regional NSW; and
- investments in the Fixed-wing Air Ambulance Services, enhancements to the specialist palliative care workforce in regional and rural NSW, and funding Tresillian for six Regional Family Care Centres and five 'Tresillian 2U' mobile vans.

SUPPORT FOR CROSS-BORDER **COMMUNITIES**

Pandemic border restrictions, in addition to bushfires, have created a unique challenge for close to two million Australians who live close to NSW borders. Support for these communities includes:

- \$5.0 million for the NSW Office of the Cross-Border Commissioner; and
- \$15.0 million from the Cross-Border Commissioner's Infrastructure Fund, supporting cross-border communities that have been demonstrably impacted by the events of the past 18 months.

SUPPORT FOR VULNERABLE PEOPLE AND REGIONAL YOUTH

- \$7.2 million support for domestic and family victim survivors with specialist case management, through the expansion of Staying Home and Leaving Violence, including in regional NSW; and
- \$7.4 million over three years to support the Office for Regional Youth, including the 2021 Regional Youth Taskforce and pilot programs aligned with the pillars of the Regional Youth Framework.

POWERING OUR STATE

The NSW Government is supporting New South Wales adapting to the global energy transition and improving network infrastructure. This includes:

- \$147.6 million in additional funding in 2021-22 (\$412.9 million over four years) to implement the NSW Electricity Infrastructure Roadmap. The Roadmap aims to attract \$32.0 billion of private investment in energy infrastructure in regional NSW, and to support 6,300 construction and 2,800 ongoing jobs mostly in regional NSW
- as part of the NSW Government's \$3.2 billion retail electricity and capacity services contract, a 100-megawatt (MW) battery will be installed and operated in the Riverina, which will boost local employment by up to 35 jobs during construction
- **\$128.0 million** in 2021-22 (regional share) to extend the uplift in the Energy Social Programs that assist low income regional households to meet their energy bills
- **\$24.0 million** in 2021-22 (as part of \$77.6 million State funding) to support a new gas-fired power station in the Illawarra that will help secure the state's electricity supply, support local manufacturers, and enable a future transition to renewable hydrogen as a fuel; and
- a minimum of \$70.0 million to develop hydrogen hubs in the Hunter and Illawarra, under the recently announced \$750.0 million Net Zero Industry and Innovation Program, to support between \$80.0 billion to \$270.0 billion of investment by 2050.

PROVIDING WATER SECURITY

- **\$68.6 million** (\$280.2 million over four years) under the \$1 billion Safe and Secure Water Program for critical local water infrastructure to maintain and improve town water supply
- **\$245.0 million** for water security projects in the Lachlan Valley, Peel Valley and the **Border Rivers Region**
- \$25.7 million for detailed planning and site assessments for pipelines between Lostock Dam to Glennies Creek Dam and between Nyngan and Cobar (including \$12.1 million from the Commonwealth Government); and
- \$23.6 million to improve non-urban water metering in the State by supporting the uptake of telemetry and upgrading WaterNSW meters, plus a further \$12.5 million for the Northern Murray Darling Basin metering program, as part of the Commonwealth Government's 2021-22 Budget, bringing total spending to \$36.1 million.

TRANSFORMING COMMUNITY **INFRASTRUCTURE**

- \$66.6 million over three years for infrastructure upgrades at racecourses across regional NSW
- \$60.0 million (as part of a \$107.9 million program) to continue redeveloping metropolitan and regional police stations across New South Wales, including at Broken Hill as well as land acquisition and planning for Port Macquarie Police Station; and
- **\$54.5 million** (as part of a \$100.0 million program) to continue investment to build and upgrade police stations in Bega, Goulburn, Jindabyne area (including Jindabyne, Perisher and Thredbo), Bourke and Bathurst, and a new police education and training facility at Dubbo.

CONNECTING OUR REGIONS

The NSW Government is delivering productivity-boosting projects to improve the movement of goods and people around NSW regions and cities.

This includes:

- \$549.5 million in 2021-22 to accelerate a range of regional transport programs and projects, including: replacing ageing timber bridges through the Fixing Country Bridges program; rollout of realtime tracking on regional bus services; continued planning and delivery of the 16 Cities program, which is boosting bus services in key regional areas; and regional road projects, aimed at supporting jobs and stimulating the economy in regional New South Wales
- **\$117.2 million** in 2021-22 (\$344.8 million over four years) for the Regional Seniors Travel Card Scheme, providing \$250 prepaid cards towards fuel, taxi travel or NSW TrainLink tickets for eligible seniors living in regional New South Wales. This includes an additional \$246.3 million to extend the program for two more years
- \$320.0 million in 2021-22 (as part of a \$1.3 billion commitment) to deliver a modern, new Regional Rail Fleet to replace the ageing XPT, XPLORER and Endeavour trains, and construct a purpose-built maintenance facility in Dubbo



- \$250.0 million over three years for a new fund to support the upgrades of regional roads transferred to the State, as part of the NSW Government's Regional Road Transfer and Road Classification Review
- \$63.8 million in 2021-22 in capital expenditure for the Fixing Country Rail program, to continue to deliver targeted infrastructure projects to upgrade parts of the regional rail network which constrain the efficient movement of rail freight and passenger services in regional NSW
- \$52.0 million in 2021-22 to complete the NSW Government's Seatbelts on School Buses program, improving school student safety through the installation of seatbelts on all dedicated school buses in rural and regional NSW
- \$45.0 million in 2021-22 to continue planning and early works for the Fast Rail program, to deliver faster connections between Sydney, Canberra, Bomaderry, Newcastle, the Central Coast and the Central West, including duplication of the line between Berry and Gerringong (State and Federal funded); and
- \$4.0 million (as part of \$20.0 million over three years) to support investment in regional tourism electric vehicle infrastructure.

EMPOWERING ABORIGINAL COMMUNITIES

Aboriginal communities across regional New South Wales are rich in diversity and hold critical traditional knowledge that enables ongoing Connection to Country.

The NSW Government recognises that initiatives targeting any improvement in outcomes for Aboriginal people and communities need to acknowledge and consider their regional distinctiveness.

NSW Treasury has established an Aboriginal Economic Wellbeing branch to develop new investment frameworks that can be used to assess initiatives that impact Aboriginal people and communities.

The Department of Regional NSW has also established an Aboriginal Partnerships team with staff based across regional NSW. These staff will work with Aboriginal businesses and communities to support job creation and Aboriginal economic development.

New and existing projects include:

- \$156.3 million in 2021-22 (as part of \$259.6 million over four years) to deliver new and upgraded social and affordable housing for Aboriginal communities across a range of major regional and metropolitan locations, supporting employment in the local construction and trade industries
- \$5.8 million in 2021-22 (as part of \$11.6 million over two years) for the extension of the Services Our Way program, providing a critical connection between government and non government services and on-the-ground, practical support and skills development for Aboriginal people and families with complex needs; and
- \$1.5 million in 2021-22 (as part of \$34.1 million over three years) to expand the Roads to Home Program, providing planning and infrastructure upgrades to up to 10 additional Aboriginal communities. This brings the Government's commitment to the Roads to Home Program to \$108.9 million for up to 31 Aboriginal communities since 2019-20.
